General Graduation Guidelines:

- Total of 120 semester hours, 33 of which must be numbered 300 or 400 (Other programs may require coursework beyond 120 semester hours)
- At least 9 semester hours of courses designated as writing intensive
- A declared major
- A cumulative GPA average of C (2.00) and at least a C average in the graduation major

WHAT YOU WILL LEARN:

- Gain an understanding of the main focus areas and applications of public health, including the identification of upstream factors (e.g., healthcare access, health behavior, socioeconomic status, etc.) that influence health outcomes.
- Identify population-based needs for public health interventions, develop programs to meet those needs, and evaluate of the effectiveness of those public health programs.
- Gain an understanding of health equity, and public health approaches to advancing health equity and reducing health disparities.

- Differentiate among, and appropriately use, measurement and surveillance techniques to assess health risks and health outcomes at the population level.
- Learn to communicate audience-appropriate public health content, both in writing and through oral presentation.
