General Graduation Guidelines:

- Total of 120 semester hours, 39 of which must be numbered 300 or 400 (Other programs may require coursework beyond 120 semester hours)
- At least 9 semester hours of courses designated as writing intensive
- · A declared major
- A cumulative GPA average of C (2.00) and at least a C average in the graduation major

WHAT YOU WILL LEARN:

- Become acquainted with the theoretical foundation of the criminal justice system
- Study of the most common crimes prosecuted in American courts, including homicide, sexual assault and theft
- Learn about the common defenses, including insanity and self-defense
- The study of criminal behavior as it relates to several varieties of crime
- Logic and methods of Criminal Justice research and its application, including project design; measurement, collecting, analysis, interpretation of data; ethical implications; and program development

- Reporting required to document encounters with criminals, victims, witnesses and other criminal justice professionals which must be in detail and in compliance with criminal and civil laws
- Understanding of the criminal justice profession and the issues confronted by these professionals
- Basic theoretical and philosophical understanding of the investigatory process. Analysis of problems encountered in interviewing, interrogating, evidence collection and admissibility will be examined and application of investigation theories
