General Graduation Guidelines:

- Total of 120 semester hours, 33 of which must be numbered 300 or 400 (Other programs may require coursework beyond 120 semester hours)
- At least 9 semester hours of courses designated as writing intensive
- · A declared major
- A cumulative GPA average of C (2.00) and at least a C average in the graduation major

ADMISSION POLICIES

Admission to the University does not guarantee admission to the Teacher Education Program. Students seeking admission to the Teacher Education program at Wesleyan should apply during the spring of their sophomore year. A student must be admitted to the Teacher Education Program before enrolling in upper-level education courses or must have permission from the Teacher Education Program. Permission will not be granted to students who have less than a 3.0 GPA.

ENTRANCE CRITERIA

A student must meet the following criteria for admission to teacher education:

- Pass the PRAXIS Core tests (reading, writing and math) as required by the NC Department of Public Instruction.
 - Students who have earned a total score of 1170 on the SAT (reading and math) or 24 on the ACT (reading and math) are exempt from Praxis Core testing requirements.
 - Students who have at least 570 on the SAT Math or 600 on the SAT Reading sections may be exempt from part of Praxis Core.
- · Achieved an overall grade point average of 3.0 on all previous college work completed at NCWU.
- · Have a successful interview with a subcommittee of the Teacher Education Council.
- Provide two positive recommendations and the required admission paperwork.
